Each week, an original line-drawing prompt is posted on X, Threads, Instagram, and Bluesky.


Now partnered with [Prune Juice Journal](#) to further explore modern haiga and its evolving voice.







- The gap between visual and verbal where meaning arises in the space neither claims
- A second juxtaposition or sign post
- I encourage poets to bring in resonance, surprise, and dissonance
- That moment when a poem activates the drawing's energy






About the poets...

Isabella Mori writes pretty much everything that's not nailed down: Fiction (a 15th century monk whose best friend is a comfrey plant), nonfiction ("All the way from the eocene on Highway 400"), and poetry (lots of haiku.) Their great love is hybrid text (haibun!). Their latest book "Believe Me" combines poetry, stories, interviews and research about mental health and addiction.
